Vocabulary Development


□Vocabulary is a set of familiar <u>words</u> within a person's <u>language</u>.

- Reading a wide variety of books is highly correlated with vocabulary size.
- ★ A child needs to encounter a word 12 or more times before s/he is able to know it and understand it.
- Repeated readings can help young children's vocabulary growth.
- Reading aloud to your child.











































Different Types of Reading

Read Aloud

Shared

Paired

Independent





Before, During & After

Before Reading:


- *Activate Prior Knowledge
- -Set the purpose for reading -Introduce the book
- Do a picture walk
- -Make connections

During Reading:

- *Respond while reading -STOP and model
- -Make connections
- -Ask & answer questions
- -Make inferences
- -Draw conclusions

After Keading

- *Think and discuss
- -Retell key events
- -Identify main idea / events
- -Ask open-ended questions



Paired Reading

 Read aloud from the book with your student.

2. When your student taps your hand, let the student read alone as you follow along silently.


- If the student reads a word wrong, skips a word, or doesn't know a word (5-second rule):
 - o Point to the word
 - o Tell them the word
 - O Have them repeat the word
 - O Join them in reading aloud again







Literacy: 8 Tips for Parents of a Struggling Reader



Locate Strengths and Weaknesses

Knowing where a child is weak in reading is the first step in helping him/her. Talk to a teacher or a reading specialist about having some testing done.



Interests... Use them!

Make sure to allow children to read things that interest them as much as possible. Encourage them to find out more about things they like.



Time to Read

Make time to read at home. Schedule it into a routine and stick with it. Make reading time POSITIVE not a punishment!



Encourage, Encourage, Encourage!

Give specific feedback on something done well. Say things like, "I like the way you used clues to figure out that word" rather than just "Good job".



Resources... What? Where?

Know where to go to find help. Join the local library and visit often. Check out websites like Raz-Kids.com and TeachYourMonstertoRead.com



Act it Out!

All children learn differently. Some may understand better when able to act out a story and will be able to get into the character's head.



Communication is KEY!

Always stay on top of your child's classroom work, but above all, read and discuss with your child at home. Talk about the books as you read them.



YOU!

More than anyone else, you are your child's number one teacher. Model what good readers do at home. Show how reading is important in life.
